God of wisdom,
You open our eyes on the world
and show us its complexities.
We see countries locked in old animosities
and communities overwhelmed
by anger and upheaval.
We pray for the millions displaced by current conflicts
and natural disasters and for leaders everywhere,
trying to find solutions to complex problems.

Open the eyes of those who lead to recognize the suffering among their peoples, and open our eyes to ways we can participate in solutions. God, in your mercy,

All: Hear our prayer.

God of hope, We offer you our prayers, longing for your peace and promise to break into the lives we care about, for the sake of Jesus Christ,

All: Amen.

And now we gather at this table in response to his commandment, to share the bread and cup of Christ's undying love, and to proclaim our faith.
