On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

The Date of Easter

The Council of Nicea in 325 set the celebration of Easter as the first Sunday after the first full moon following the spring equinox (March 21). The earliest possible date for Easter is March 22 and the latest is April 25.

Calculation of Easter dates has always been complex and most people in previous centuries consulted tables prepared by church scholars. Similar calendars/tables are still found at the beginning of many printed prayer books. The date of Easter is a key date for calculating all of the moveable feasts that are connected with it e.g. Ascension and Pentecost so it is extremely important to know the correct date and to be able to have the date several years in advance.

Today the Western and Eastern (Orthodox) Churches celebrate Easter on a different date. This difference is based on the reform of the secular calendar undertaken by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582. The Gregorian reform of the calendar meant the immediate "loss" of 10 days in 1582 in order to correct problems with the Julian Calendar worked out by Julius Caesar in 46 B.C. (England did not adopt the Gregorian Calendar until 1752 and then lost 12 days in September.)

The "Orthodox Churches, even though most of them have adopted the Gregorian Calendar for fixed feasts, still calculate Easter according to the Julian Calendar, and, as their calculation of the Paschal full moon is five days later than the astronomical full moon, their Easter sometimes coincides with the Western date, but is often one, four or five weeks later". In the period 2001-2025 the Eastern and Western dates for Easter were the same in seven years.
