

Come, Christ Jesus, be our guide through the darkening days and the chill of winter.

Show us the way to wisdom and gratitude. We are thankful for the kindness we know in friends and good neighbours, in warm houses and warm smiles.

Encourage us to reach out to those who need your embrace and ours, so that together we may sing of your presence:

Jesus, Emmanuel:

All: we open our hearts to you.

Come, Christ Jesus, be our hope in the uncertain times in which we find ourselves.

Touch us with your healing and grace.

We remember before you those we know and those known to you alone who are living with loss or illness this season, those who face depression or discouragement, and any who will find it hard to be merry this year.

Keep silence for 15-20 seconds.

Shine the light of your courage and comfort into their lives so that we may sing together in your love:

Jesus, Emmanuel:

All: we open our hearts to you.

Come, Christ Jesus,
be our king and claim your rightful place in our hearts.
Our world is struggling
and yearning for the justice and mercy you bring.
Draw near to all leaders
and all citizens working for peace and justice.
Encourage honourable action
and co-operation on all sides.
Give hope to people under oppression
and those who live with fear or hunger day by day.
Hasten the day when the world's peoples
will live as neighbours,
reconciled in your truth and freedom
so that all may know the joy we sing:

Jesus, Emmanuel:

All: we open our hearts to you.

In this time – first in silence, we offer our prayers for those who have asked us to pray for them...

Jesus, Emmanuel:

All: we open our hearts to you.

Good and gracious God, hear the prayers of your people this day. Satisfy the longing of our hearts, bless us with the knowledge of your lasting love for us. We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Saviour.

All: Amen.

Invitation and Peace (Please stand as you are able.)

Priest: The table of bread and wine is now to be made ready. It is the table of company with Jesus and with all those who love him. It is the table of sharing with the poor of the world, with whom Jesus identified himself. It is the table of communion with the earth in which Christ became incarnate.

So, come to this table, you who have faith and you who would like to come to know it more. You who have been to this sacrament often, and you who have not been for a long time. You who have tried to follow Jesus, and you who have failed.

Come. It is Christ who invites us to meet him here.

As we prepare to come to the table let us exchange a sign of peace with one another.

Priest: The peace of the Lord be always with you.

Eucharistic Prayer

Priest: May God be with you.

All: And also with you.

Priest: Lift up your hearts.

All: We lift them to the Lord.

Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Priest:

It is indeed right and good to give you thanks and praise, almighty God and everlasting Father, through Jesus Christ your Son. For when he humbled himself to come among us in human flesh, he fulfilled the plan you formed before the foundation of the world to open for us the way of salvation. Confident that your promise will be fulfilled, we now watch for the day when Christ our Lord will come again in glory.

And so we join our voices with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven to proclaim your glory, for ever praising you and singing:

All: Holy, holy, holy, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full, are full of your glory. Hosanna! Hosanna! Hosanna in the highest! (x2) Blessed, blessed, blessed, blessed is the one coming in the name, the name of our God. Hosanna! Hosanna! Hosanna in the highest! (x2) [From: St. Aidan Setting; John Bell, The Iona Community]

Priest: Accept our praises, heavenly Father, through your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ, and as we follow his example and obey his command, grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit these gifts of bread and wine may be to us his body and his blood;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying:
Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.
Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Therefore, heavenly Father, we remember his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross; we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; we look for the coming of your kingdom, and with this bread and this cup we make the memorial of Christ your Son our Lord.

All: Christ has died.
Christ is risen.
Christ will come again.

Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of thanks and praise, and as we eat and drink these holy gifts in the presence of your divine majesty, renew us by your Spirit, inspire us with your love and unite us in the body of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

*Donations Towards St. Luke's Grand Piano – We now have purchased a Baldwin Model R Artist Grand Piano, as approved by Parish Council at our November Council meeting. While this is a wonderful addition to St. Luke's music program and will help make the space very suitable for concerts and recitals, this expenditure was not included when we approved this year's budget at our AGM in February. So we would greatly appreciate donations towards the \$6,500 which was spent for the piano, its cost (\$6,000) plus the moving costs to bring it to St. Luke's (\$500).
