From the Rector's Desk

Dear Friends,

Peace be with you. One of the readings we heard recently is the well-known story in the gospel of Matthew describing Jesus walking on water. The disciples are gathered together in a boat and a storm suddenly sweeps over the waters. Jesus is not with them at the time. He is up on the mountain reflecting and praying after a very busy day of explaining parables and feeding 5000 plus people. The disciples are panicking in the boat, and after what seems like a long time, they see what they think is a ghostly figure

walking towards them on the heavy seas. In their fear, they fail to recognize that it is Jesus. Then a word is spoken, "Do not be afraid." Don't be seized by fear. And we hear Peter boldly saying, "If it IS you, command me to get out of the boat and walk towards you." Jesus tells him to do so.

Now let's pause for a moment. The sense of fear is not rare in the scriptures. The Bible is filled with themes and stories that expose fear in both the New and Old Testaments. Fear is also a reality that you and I live with, that our world lives with. Fear is a prime motivator in our lives. Some fears are rational, and some are not so much. And I think that we can all relate to the disciples in the gospel story who also express rational fear – fear of drowning – and less rational fear – fear of a ghost. But then we have Peter, the one who surprises us countless times. He boldly responds to Jesus' command to go on the water to face his fears – and to keep moving towards Jesus.

It is interesting how we often interpret Jesus' next comment about Peter when he says, "You of little faith," after Peter begins to sink into the water and pleads to be rescued. We often think of Peter failing a test or stumbling, and we think he is being criticized for sinking in his faith. What if we understood this differently? What if Jesus is not necessarily criticizing but commending Peter for having little but enough faith to step out of the boat and walk towards him? Remember in a previous chapter in Matthew, Jesus taught about little faith – the faith of a mustard seed that grows into a great bush – something insignificant that becomes something great.

Now, what if Jesus is also calling to each one of us as well? We know the living word does continually speak to us as we always deepen our understanding of the Scriptures. As Peter and the disciples were called to trust in faith, even in a little faith, we are being addressed in the same way as a parish. Is Jesus saying to us, "You of little faith, walk into a future that grows out of something small into something wondrous?" We are journeying through some structural changes in the way we organize ourselves and the way we operate as a parish. This is so we may all take responsibility for the future of this parish, by each participating in the ministry of this parish and becoming a vital part of the local expression of our mission of being the body of Christ, which is you and I together. We of little faith can do big things here in this place, and beyond.

And so Jesus says, "Get out of the boat and walk to me."

May God bless you.

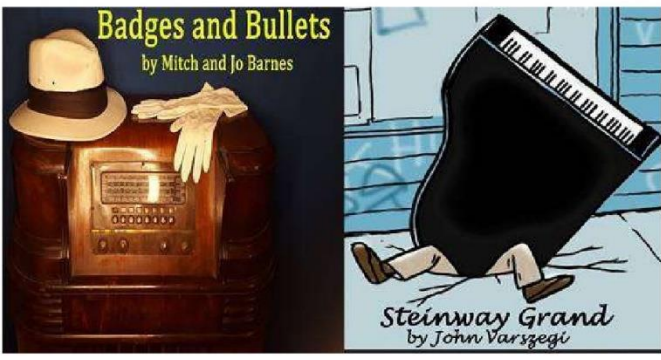

Elizabeth Knight, Gillian Bloom, Vicki Sharp, and Linda Poilievre set the tables with teacups and saucers, napkins, and roses in brandy snifters to make it all look lovely. Chintz bunting, table centres, and cushions added to the charm.

The members of Vintage Fashion Showcase presented a wonderful display of Downton fashions, or what would have been worn from the time of the Titanic tragedy to the 1930's. They were augmented by the beautiful music of Lynn Dennis, our talented keyboardist. Donna Dunning wrote the script, with a loose story of the Grantham family. Sixteen models with two dressers, participated, most making three changes of costume. Mike Turnham enjoyed being the telegram boy.

Eight members of St. Luke's plus a friend, dressed as housemaids. They did a terrific job greeting guests, selling hats, fascinators, and "Estate Sale" items (left over from our Spring Fair), appearing in the show, serving the lemonade, tea, coffee and strawberry shortcake, and helping with clean-up. After the show, which lasted one hour and fifteen minutes, the draw prize tickets were sold as our guests enjoyed their delicious shortcake.



Our thanks to all the kitchen crew, including Sandra Lindberg, Linda Poilievre, Jane Grant, Vicki Sharp, and Gillian Bloom. Draw prize tickets were drawn and everyone lingered to enjoy the garden and chat with friends. It was a lot of work, but a very successful event. \$2,040 was raised from tickets, \$486 from the sale of hats, fascinators and Estate Sale items, and \$136 from the door prizes, totalling \$2,662 (minus expenses).

We even received two very glowing thank you cards from a total stranger saying how much they enjoyed the event.

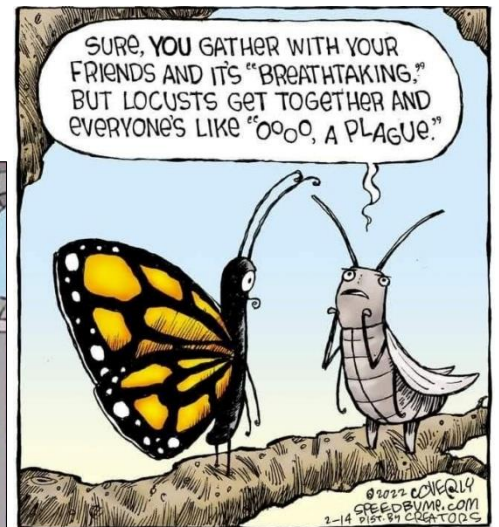
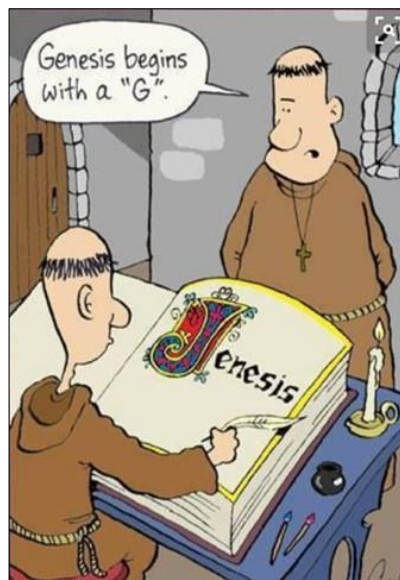
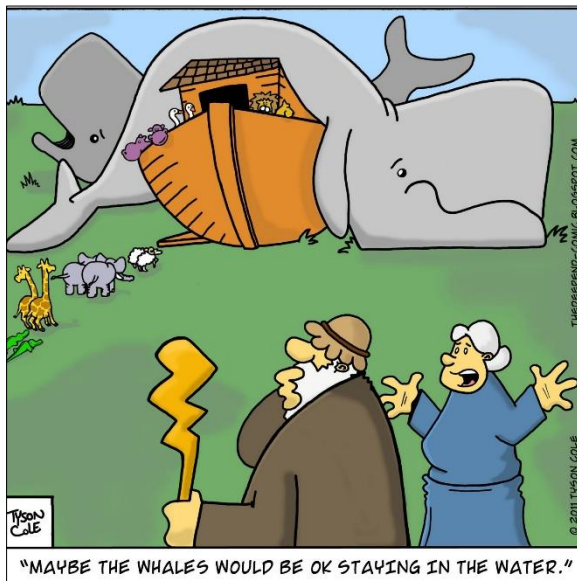

2026 Amazing Journey Day Camp

2026 was the 15th year for the Amazing Journey Day Camp, a joint venture of St. Luke Cedar Hill and our neighbours, Lutheran Church of the Cross. This year's camp was held in the mornings at Lutheran Church of the Cross. The theme was Unlocking God's Promises. We had 34 campers registered. Volunteers who helped for all or part of the week included 11 Leaders in Training (middle school students), 14 Youth Leaders (high school and older), and 11 adults. Many youth leaders have helped each year for four or five years and look forward to coming back each year. Each day started with singing and a puppet show by the Leaders in Training to tell the parable, the mystery of the day. The morning continued with crafts in the Investigation Lab, games in the Training Academy, story time in the Detective Agency, and a snack, which tied in with the day's parable.

We received lots of positive feedback from parents and caregivers about the camp. Comments included: "My child loved it and he is already asking to come back next year." "The songs my son comes home singing warm my heart." "Very supportive environment for the kids. I know they are safe and having fun every day they are here!" Another parent commented that she enrolled her child in six camps last year but the Amazing Journey Day Camp was the only one she really enjoyed. So this year she only enrolled her child in the Amazing Journey Day Camp. The main suggestions for improvement were that parents wished there were more weeks of camp!

We are already looking ahead to next year's camp at St. Luke's, from July 5 - 9. We welcome volunteers, adults and youth, who would like to help with planning and assist during the camp. 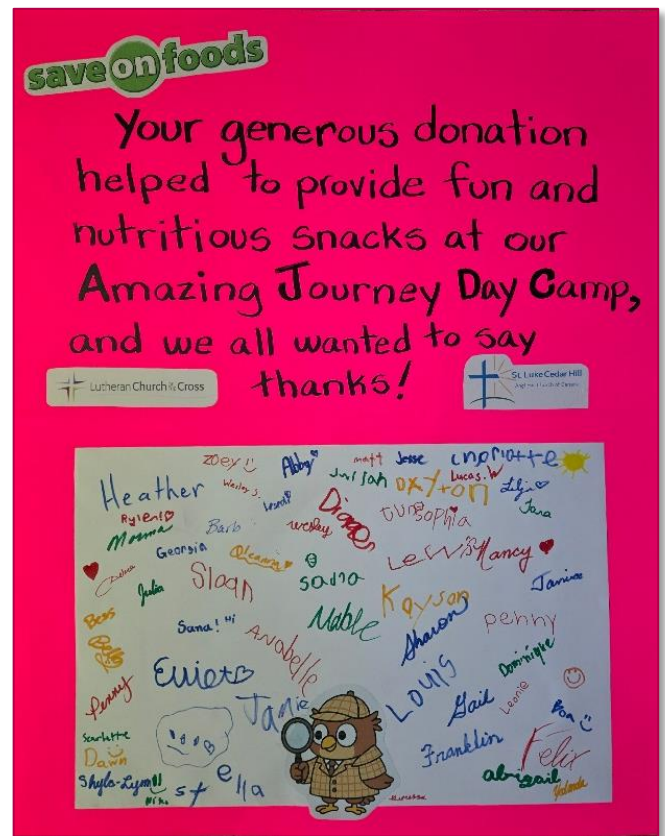


Happy Camper Snacks

There and Back to Terminus Mountain

Terminus Mountain

In July, we drove from Vancouver north along the Alaska Highway to Toad River where there was a store and an airstrip. From there we would be able to fly in a small aircraft about 100 kilometres west to the camp. When we arrived at Toad River, two problems became apparent. Typical of a small airfield, there was no air traffic control and the airstrip was roughly parallel to the Alaska Highway. Hence, a pilot needed to be alert during takeoff to avoid an aircraft colliding with the top of the large transport vehicles travelling on the highway.

Some years ago, I joined a survey party to collect water samples and map the geology around Terminus Mountain in northern British Columbia. Terminus Mountain marks a change in topography from the Rocky Mountains in the south to the Liard Plateau in the north. Near the mountain on the Kechika River, there was an outfitters' camp with a lodge and cabins where we stayed for the survey.

The other problem was the weather. Soon after we arrived at Toad River, several of our party successfully flew to the Kechika River camp in a four-seater Cessna aircraft.

However, others, including myself and all of our equipment, remained in Toad River because rain and low clouds made flying impossible. After two days at Toad River, the weather improved and flights to the camp resumed. Sitting in the co-pilot's seat, I accompanied the pilot on one flight with our equipment loaded in the aircraft behind us. After about an hour in the air, the pilot turned to me and remarked, "I'm

feeling rather sleepy. Would you mind flying the plane for a bit?" With some misgivings, I agreed since the aircraft had dual controls. With trepidation, I took hold of the yoke and let my feet rest on the foot pedals. For about the next ten minutes it was an unforgettable experience actually flying the aircraft before the pilot resumed control and landed the aircraft at the camp.

For the next ten days, members of the party mapped the geology and collected water samples for trace metal analysis from several intriguing rusty seepages that dotted the landscape. One of my tasks was to test the water samples soon after collection for factors such as acidity and to preserve them for later analysis.

The only incident of note during our time in the camp was the rescue of Pierre, a French tourist, who had decided to experience a solo Northern BC adventure by canoeing down the Kechika River. He was left by a guide on the river about fifty kilometers upstream from our camp with a canoe, camping equipment, food and shotgun, but met with disaster when his canoe overturned in some rapids. Given the rough water it was amazing that Pierre managed to regain the riverbank, but with only his shotgun and his travel documents. By chance, our project leader decided on a reconnaissance in a powerboat for several kilometers

upstream from our camp. Seeing Pierre on the bank, he rescued him from his predicament. Pierre spent several days with us before a flight could be arranged for him to begin his journey back to France.

Having finished sampling and mapping, we returned to Vancouver. My most vivid memories of the ten days spent in Northern BC are the spectacular mountain terrain we traversed, my brief experience piloting a plane, and the rescue of Pierre.

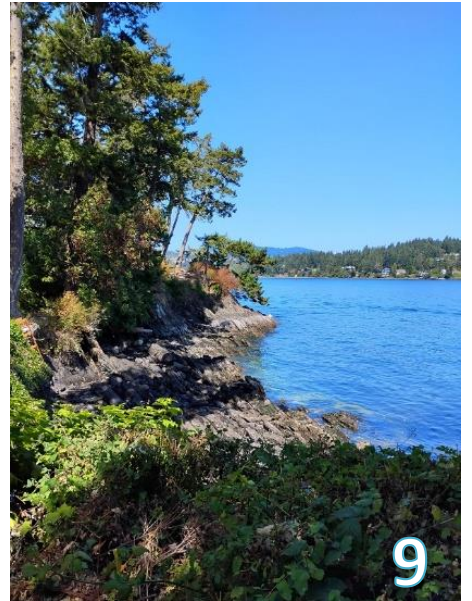

Answered Prayer

Last September, my two-year-old cousin Cal fell suddenly very ill and was rushed to hospital. He was diagnosed with Stage 3 nephroblastoma (Wilms tumour), the most common kidney cancer in children. Our whole family froze. A wedding was indefinitely postponed. Parents went on hiatus from their jobs. Cal's big sister, then aged 4, suddenly spent a lot of time with grandparents or cousins, and everyone got very familiar with the inside of the BC Children's Hospital.

One relative said, "Don't worry. He's on the prayer lists of at least four congregations." This seemed naive to some of us. We're talking about cancer here. Stage three cancer. In a toddler. If anything, the assertion that prayer could have any effect felt almost insulting. What kind of God would do this to a child and his family in the first place?

This happy little guy had a kidney removed and then endured several rounds of chemo. His blond hair and brows disappeared, along with the baby fat in his cheeks. His parents sat in waiting rooms for hours-long surgeries, wondering, terrified.

Two weeks ago, my mum was visiting when she got the call from my uncle, Cal's grandpa. When she burst into tears, I feared the worst. But they didn't find any cancer on his last scan after his final round of chemo. Cal is officially in remission.

People of St. Luke's, you have been praying for Cal since September, his name tucked in a list of anonymous folk every Sunday. Thank you for your prayers. Regardless of their effect on my cousin's immune system, rows of people praying for him certainly made me feel better. I'm sure the loved ones of the other names on the list feel upheld by your prayers as well.

Hundreds of people surrounded and supported my family, especially the inner circle of Cal's household. Generosity flowed. North Point Brewing created a special beer with partial proceeds dedicated, in Cal's honour, to Balding for Dollars. The Calvin and Hopes fundraising campaign had to keep increasing their fundraising goals because of how quickly they'd meet them.

Cal's journey was hard and awful, and had a happy ending (for now and, God willing, for a long while). And now, because so many people love Cal and his people, many more families who need support through a cancer journey will get more help.

Calvinandhopes.ca has raised over \$80K as of today. This too will answer prayers.



Silver and Sage at St. Luke's

A Year of Connection

We started Silver and Sage Seniors' Social Program at St. Luke Cedar Hill in September 2025, and here we are in August 2026, having survived our first year. Our premise was to offer a program as an outreach to the community. While some of our members are from our parish, we have also reached others from the community who need connection. We have over 100 people on our contact list, and on average 25-30 people come to our meetings. Not all can come every time, but we notice that people are making friends.

As we devised our program, we gathered a list of objectives that would address the needs of seniors. Our list included emotional, intellectual, and physical needs. Connection with others, we felt, was key to healthy ageing, as was gaining a sense of purpose. We decided to rely on volunteers to make it happen.

We offer a two-hour session twice a month, on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays, at 1:30 pm. We usually have a presentation followed by social time with refreshments. Our presentations are on diverse topics of interest. We draw from the people we know, so many of us having expertise in areas others would love to know about. People have generously offered us their time and knowledge. Nearly all our presenters have been seniors.

Our presenters have included scientists, artists, storytellers, and musicians. We have learned about topics as varied as prospecting for gold, herbs and lore, and expeditions to the Polar regions; we've met authors and learned how to use our computers and cell phones. At our most recent session, we had two members of a youth ensemble, the Island Ukuleles, who performed and told us about their European tour.

Coming up on September 10th, we have a health/fitness related topic, "Fall Prevention Starts with YOU", presented by Susanne Reul-Zastre, an older adult fitness specialist who holds a Canadian Fall Prevention

Curriculum Certificate from UVic. That is followed by another health-related topic on September 24th. Dr. Elissa McMurtrie will give an informative lecture called, "Nurses: Guardians Against Darkness and Chaos." Dr. McMurtrie, who had a long career in medicine, started out as a nurse and eventually transitioned into being a surgeon. Many retired nurses in our membership are looking forward to that talk. At the beginning of October, we will have a special Silver and Sage session on Saturday, October 3rd from 1:30 – 3:30 pm. This session will feature two Radio Plays by the Langham Court Readers' Theatre – Badges and Bullets, and Steinway Grand. (See further information on page 4.)

Summer Student Report

[Editors’ Note: St. Luke’s was fortunate to receive a Canada Summer Jobs Grant this year. Through this grant, we were able to hire Shannon Stewart to work for us. Shannon worked for us last summer and since then she has completed the first year of a Dual Masters in Library and Archival Studies at UBC. St. Luke’s was blessed to have Shannon complete this work for us this summer.]

This summer, I worked at St. Luke’s as an archives student on a Canada Summer Jobs grant. I worked here last summer on the same grant.

This year, my tasks were focused on the digital records of the Parish. The major parts of this project were writing policies and reorganizing the SharePoint to fit with the new committee structure.

I created three policies that will guide how records are handled at St. Luke’s:

- Retention/Disposition Policy: Describes types of records that the Parish produces and how long they should be kept, aligning with legislation and Diocese policies.
- Digital Records Organization Policy: Outlines how the SharePoint should be organized and how digital records should be stored/accessed.
- Archival Acquisition Policy: Describes the types of records that should be added into the Parish archive.

I also made a Records Management Manual, which gives instructions for different aspects of records management. It is mainly geared towards future summer students, but it includes sections with instructions for wardens and committee members.

Another project I undertook this summer was putting the flags that used to hang at the front of the church into St. Luke’s Archives. The Canadian flag is not supposed to be kept and has been given to our local Legion branch to be disposed of properly. The other flags have been added into St. Luke’s Archives in a special textiles box.

I hope that my work this summer has been useful to the church. Thank you very much for hiring me! I appreciate the opportunity to apply what I’ve learned so far in my Archive/Library Masters to a real organization.

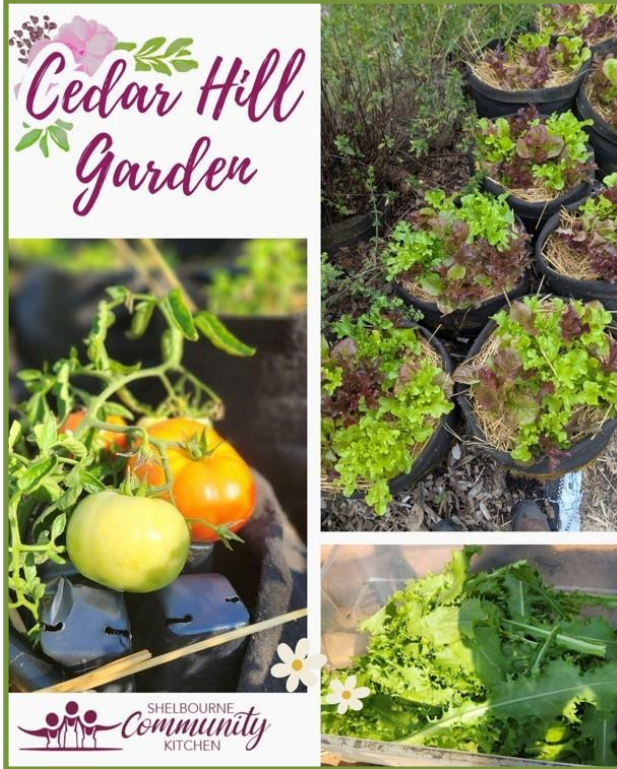
